EDUCATIONAL PHILOSOPHY

The Frederic School District believes that:

1. All areas of athletics and extracurricular activities are valuable learning environments.
2. All areas of athletics and extracurricular activities are extensions of the classroom, including, but not limited to, locker rooms, playing venues, buses, and trips. Students involved represent the school at all times.
3. Social conduct of minors is the responsibility of parents first and the legal system second. The school system supports these efforts.
4. While participation in extracurricular activities is valuable, it is also a privilege that comes with certain academic, attendance, and behavioral responsibilities.
5. This policy shall govern all extracurricular activities and all students, including homeschool students, who choose to participate.

The goal of the school district is to create and sustain valuable learning opportunities, both inside and outside the classroom, so students and athletes can maximize their potential.

The Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association (WIAA) mandates each participating school must have a policy on eligibility and expected behavior. The WIAA sets parameters for each school to work within, so all components of the Frederic code meet the WIAA requirements for eligibility.

It is important for athletes and parents/guardians to understand that if students violate applicable sections of the code, students who participate in both athletic and non-athletic extracurricular activities run the risk of sanctions in both types of events concurrently.

****All activities that are considered an extension of the classroom rather than an extracurricular activity will not be governed by this code of conduct. Examples of activities that are an extension of the classroom would be concerts performed by the full band and choirs, field trips, and student travel. The principal and athletic director will determine whether an activity is an extension of the classroom or an extracurricular activity.**

Eligibility

- A middle school student must be under the age of 15 before August 1 of each school year.
- A student must be a full-time student enrolled in an approved program working towards an Frederic High School Diploma. Full-time student is defined further in the WIAA Handbook. Home schooled students residing in the Frederic School District are also eligible to participate.
- WIAA Physical or Alternate Year Card is required for students participating in interscholastic athletics. Exams taken after April 1st are good for the following two school years. Exams taken before April 1st are good for the remainder of the school year and the following school year. In years when a physical exam is not required, a WIAA alternate year athletic permit card must be turned in.
- Extracurricular Activities Code/Emergency Medical Form signed annually by both student and parents/guardians, which indicates an understanding of the activity code. The emergency form serves as consent to treat in case of emergency. It also provides emergency contact information. All forms will be kept on file in the athletic office.
- WIAA Parent/Athlete Rules of Eligibility Sign-off Form signed annually indicating that both student and parents/guardians have read, understood, and agreed to abide by the WIAA Rules of Eligibility.
- Concussion testing must be completed every year.
- Open enrolled students entering 9th/10th grade at the beginning of the school year and are within the first 6 consecutive trimesters of High School will be unrestricted.
- Open enrolled students entering 11th grade are restricted to non-varsity for one calendar year unless they have never participated in that WIAA sport in any capacity.
- Open enrolled students entering 12th grade are ineligible to compete at any level for one calendar year unless they have never participated in that WIAA sport in any capacity.
- A student that transfers from one school to another with a suspension due to athletic code violation(s) from the previous school must serve that mandated suspension at the new school.
- Receive a briefing from the coach, summarizing the WIAA rules.
- Behave in a manner consistent with school rules and Board of Education policies.
- **Attend the student/parent meeting before the beginning of the season, or view a recorded presentation of the meeting**

Academic Eligibility

- **Standards**
 - A student in grades 6-12 may not have any failures during the grading period or at the end of the grading period.
- **Guidelines**
 - Eligibility will be assessed every three weeks during each trimester of the school year.
 - Eligibility for fall sports shall depend on the grades earned in trimester 3 of the previous academic year. 8th grade students are considered academically eligible unless otherwise determined by an administrator.
 - Eligibility for winter sports will be based on Trimester 1 and Trimester 2(if applicable).
 - Eligibility for spring sports will be based on Trimester 2 and Trimester 3(if applicable).
 - Students who are under academic suspension are allowed to practice/travel/dress in uniform at the discretion and approval of administration.
 - Students are responsible for any school work missed due to extracurricular activities. They are expected to make every effort to contact the instructor prior to the absence.
- **Consequences and Procedure**
 - Consequences for failure to meet the Academic Eligibility Criteria will be administered as follows:
 - **One Failing Class-** Student will be ineligible for **10%** of the total games scheduled for that sport season. The individual must attend all practices and games and will be unable to dress in uniform for competitions. After the violation is served, the student must be passing all classes to regain eligibility.
 - **Two Failing Classes-** Student will be ineligible for one-third of the maximum number of games/activities/meets allowed in that sport/activity as determined by the WIAA (rounded up if one third results in a fraction). After the violation is served, the student must be passing all classes to regain eligibility.
 - **Two Failing Classes for FALL ATHLETICS:** Per the WIAA, when the earliest allowed competition/ performance takes place before the first day of classes, the rule will read as follows: The minimum ineligibility period shall be the lesser of (1) 21 days beginning with the date of the earliest allowed competition or (2) one-third of the maximum number of games/activities/meets allowed in that sport/activity as determined by the WIAA (rounded up if one-third results in a fraction).
 - **C. Three or More Failing Classes(end of trimester)-** Student will be ineligible for the **next grading trimester**. The individual must attend all practices and games and will be unable to dress in uniform for competitions. After the violation is served, the student must be passing all classes to regain eligibility.

- Academic suspensions for failing grades will begin the first competition after the term has ended and grades are considered final.
- Grade checks are completed every three weeks. Student will be informed of failing grades on a Monday and suspension will begin on 3:00 p.m. on Friday of that same week.
- The coach will not allow the athlete to participate in competitions until they have received an academic reinstatement form to be filled out by the athlete and turned into the athletic director.

*Note: The WIAA considers a **scrimmage** as a **practice**. A student-athlete suspended for contests or events will not be able to count a scrimmage as a lost contest or event. A contest penalty will occur in all lost eligibility situations. If a scheduled contest is postponed or canceled and a student-athlete was ineligible for that contest, their ineligibility will be served at the next contest.*

Attendance

- A student must be present by **8:05 a.m.** of the school day to participate in practice or a scheduled contest on that day unless approved by an administrator.
- If an athlete is marked for an unexcused absence during the school day at any time, then they are unable to participate in practice or attend scheduled contests.
- Attendance for student athletes at practices and games is mandatory, with the exception of injury or illness, or with the specific consent of the coach or advisor. Consequences will be determined by specific coaches and advisors.
- Students serving an in- or out-of-school suspension may not participate or attend practices, games, or events during the suspension and until they have resumed attending classes after completion of the suspension.

Changing Sports

- An athlete may not quit one sport and begin another during the same season except by agreement of the coaches involved and/or the athletic director.
- A student cut from one sport may try out for another sport providing he/she was in good standing in the previous sport.
- Athletes cannot participate in more than one sport at the same time in the same season. Exceptions to this rule may be granted upon approval. They can participate only after approval of advisor/coaches and parents/guardians as well as completion of [Dual Sport Agreement](#).

Athletic Injuries

- All injuries must be reported to the supervising coach or athletic director immediately. The athletic director will file the appropriate injury report within 48 hours. Parents/Guardians should follow up with the athletic director.
- In the case of any emergency, students will be sent to the nearest hospital, unless parents have indicated a specific hospital for treatment.
- The office should be informed by parents/guardians prior to participation, of an athlete who has any special medical conditions. The student athlete and parent/guardian should also communicate this information with their child's coach(es).
- If an injury has been discovered after the athlete has returned home from a practice or competition, the coach and athletic director should be notified as soon as possible.
- In the event of a medical emergency, every effort will be made to contact the parents of the student.
- However, if contact cannot be made or the medical emergency requires immediate attention, Frederic School coaches, advisors, athletic trainers, and supervisors are advised to seek medical attention/transportation.
- Frederic School District has supplementary health/medical accident insurance. If a student is injured while participating in school-related activities and the family's insurance does not cover all of the medical expenses, this insurance may qualify as supplementary insurance, subject to the deductible. Claim forms are available at the 6-12 office and should be filed as soon as possible after the injury/medical emergency.

Transportation

- Athletes must travel with the team on provided school transportation to away events. An exception for this would be for a student to be picked up by a parent/guardian (after the event) upon the coach receiving either written or oral (face to face) permission.

Parent/Guardian Communication with Coach

Parents and coaches each have their responsibilities. A parent's main responsibility is their own child. The coach's main responsibility is their program. By establishing an understanding of each position, we are better able to accept the actions of the other and provide a greater benefit to children. As parents, when your child is involved in our program, you have the right to understand what expectations are placed on them. This begins with clear communication from the coach of the sport.

- **Communication Coaches Expect from Athletes and Parents/Guardians**

- Concerns expressed directly to the coach by the student first, then the parent/guardian if a solution has not been reached.
- Notification of any schedule conflicts in advance.
- Notification of illness or injury as soon as possible.
- As your child becomes involved in their programs, they will experience some of the most rewarding moments of their lives. It is important to understand that there also may be times when things do not go the way you and your child wish. Coaches are professionals. They make decisions based on what they believe to be best for all students involved. It is important that all parties remain professional in all interactions.

Appropriate / Inappropriate Concerns to Discuss with Coaches:

- The following topics are appropriate for discussion:
 - The treatment of your child.
 - Ways to help your child improve.
 - Concerns about your child's behavior.
- If you have a concern that is appropriate to discuss with a coach, the following procedure should be followed:
 - The student should communicate concerns to the coach first to try and resolve.
 - The parent/guardian communicates to the coach the desire to discuss the concern. If the coach cannot be reached after reaching out for 24 hours, please contact the Athletic Director to assist in the communication process.
 - Please **DO NOT** attempt to confront a coach before or after a contest or practice. These can be emotional times for the student, parent/guardian, and coach. Please wait at least **24** hours before communicating to allow emotions to settle.
- The following items should be left to the discretion of the coach:
 - Playing time, positioning, and event entry.
 - Team strategies, game tactics, play calling.
 - Any discussion about other students.

Illegal Substance Use

- Students participating or wishing to participate in interscholastic athletic activities and clubs/activities are prohibited from the following:
 - Use, possession, buying or selling drugs, alcohol, look-alike drugs and/or inhalants
 - Use, possession of anabolic-androgenic steroids and other performance enhancing substances (PES)
 - Use, possession, buying or selling tobacco products. This includes e-cigarettes/vaping devices of ANY kind.
 - Shall not knowingly enter a vehicle that is transporting alcoholic beverages and/or illicit substances unless they are under the direct supervision of their parents or legal guardians.

Illegal Substance Use Consequences

Athletics

- **First violation:** The athlete must continue to practice and travel with the team, but may not participate in games for at least 25% of the scheduled season for that sport. The suspension carries over into the athlete's next season if necessary (equivalent to the number of events remaining in the season when the infraction occurs.)
- **Second violation:** The athlete must continue to practice and travel with the team, but may not participate in games for 50% of the scheduled season for that sport. The suspension carries over into the athlete's next season if necessary (equivalent to the number of events remaining in the season when the infraction occurs.)
- **Third and beyond violations:** The athlete is prohibited from participating in interscholastic athletics in any way for the equivalent of one calendar year. The student must perform eight hours of school-approved community service prior to becoming eligible.
 - A suspended athlete will be stripped of the opportunity to be Team Captain during any season in which they are serving a suspension. Individual coaches may have other guidelines regarding end-of-season awards, including lettering and season awards.
 - A student who completes one (1) year without any violation will have his/her last violation dropped. Any subsequent violations after the first violation will remain on the student's athletic violation record. A student who commits a second, third, or more violations cannot have their last violation dropped even if a year passes.
- **Self-Referral** - A student who violates the code may report the violation to the high school principal or athletic director via phone, in person, or email. If the student does so within twenty-four (24) hours of the violation, the student may be eligible for a reduced penalty for the violation. **Any violation that is being investigated by law enforcement or school officials on or before the time of self-referral is not eligible for a reduced penalty. Note: a student would not be eligible for the self-referral clause if they received a citation.** The self-referral can only be used for the 1st athletic code violation and will result in a 10% (10% of the regular season's scheduled events rounded up if the number results is a fraction of .5 or higher) penalty. **Self-referral is at the discretion of the principal and athletic director.*
- **If a student is not able to fulfill their suspension because a season has ended, they will serve the remainder of their suspension in the succeeding sport. The individual must complete both athletic seasons for the suspension to be considered fulfilled.*

- *Example: Student A receives an athletic code violation at the end of their spring season. It is a 4 game suspension. They are able to serve 2 games in the spring and then the season ends. Since they have technically served a 10% suspension (in this example), they will need to serve 10% of their next sport to fulfill their 20% suspension.*
- *Athletic Code suspensions that result in a fraction of a game are rounded to the nearest game. Example: 2.5 = 3 games. 2.4 = 2 games.*

Extracurricular Activities

- **First Violation:** Suspension for 2 meetings of activity except for graded performances
- **Second Violation:** Suspension for 4 meetings and a minimum of one event/competition
- **Third and Beyond Violations:** Suspension for one calendar year from all activities
- **Self-Referral:** A student who violates the code may report the violation to the high school principal or athletic director via phone, in person, or email. If the student does so within twenty-four (24) hours of the violation, the student may be eligible for a reduced penalty for the violation. **Any violation that is being investigated by law enforcement or school officials on or before the time of self-referral is not eligible for a reduced penalty. Note: a student would not be eligible for the self-referral clause if they received a citation.** The self-referral can only be used for the 1st athletic code violation and will result in one meeting. **Self-referral is at the discretion of the principal and athletic director.*
- Certain clubs and organizations have different sets of rules for their consequences which may be more strict than those listed here.

Attending Parties or Events with Banned Substances

Attending Parties or Events: Students who knowingly attend an event at which any of the above-banned items are being illegally consumed will be sanctioned. Because of the variable number and nature of events in our extracurricular clubs and activities, the specific sanctions will be determined by the club advisor and the principal and provided in writing to participants and parents upon a student joining the activity.

- **First offense:** Athlete must continue to practice and travel with the team, but is suspended from participation in the number of athletic events equivalent to 10% of an entire season. The suspension carries over into the athlete's next season if necessary (equivalent to the number of events remaining in the season when the infraction occurs.)
- **Second offense:** Athlete must continue to practice and travel with the team, but may not participate in the equivalent of 30% of the season's athletic events. The suspension carries over into the athlete's next season if necessary (equivalent to the number of events remaining in the season when the infraction occurs.)
- **Third offense:** Athlete is suspended for the equivalent of an entire season, and may not practice or travel with any team until the suspension is completed. The suspension carries over into the athlete's next season if necessary (equivalent to the number of events remaining in the season when the infraction occurs.)
 - Subsequent violations will be treated as third offenses.
 - Any subsequent violations after the first violation will remain on the student's athletic violation record. A student who commits a second, third, or more violations cannot have their last violation dropped even if a year passes.

Exception: *A student finding him or herself at a party or event at which any of the above items are being illegally consumed can avoid sanctions by leaving immediately upon learning of the illegal consumption.*

Note A: *Students in the circumstance are encouraged to call their parents and report the illegal party or event so that dangerous driving can be prevented. Note that records of a cell phone call can be evidence of the time a student has left an event.*

Note B: *Sanctions will not be avoided if the student has consumed any of the items listed in the paragraph above describing banned substances.*

Conduct

The participant must conduct themselves in a manner which upholds the principles and standards of the Frederic School District and the WIAA. Student athletes are visible members of our community that need to represent the Frederic School District in the most positive way. Behavior which reflects negatively on themselves, their team, the Athletic Department, or the Frederic School District may be grounds for disciplinary action.

Conduct that could result in disciplinary action may include, **but is not limited to** the following:

- Violating any Federal or Wisconsin law, any municipal or county ordinance, or law of any other jurisdiction in conformity with the Wisconsin Criminal Statutes (See Appendix 1). It is not necessary for a student to have been issued a citation to be considered a violation.
- A student charged and/or convicted of a felony shall, upon the filing of felony charges, become ineligible for all further participation until the student has paid his/her debt to society and the courts consider the sentence served (including probation, community service, etc.).
- Disrespect toward teachers, officials, other school personnel, or students as determined by administration.
- Using biased or harassing behavior including profane, vulgar, racist, sexist, or homophobic language.
- Posting disparaging or disrespectful comments regarding coaches, school staff members, game officials, Frederic students, opposing school students on social media or via texting. Reports of such violations must occur within **10 school days** of actual occurrence.

Anonymous reports will be disregarded.

- Engaging in any form of sexual harassment. Sexual harassment is defined as deliberate, repeated or unwanted verbal or physical contact, sexually explicit derogatory statement, or sexually discriminating remarks that is offensive or objectionable to the recipient or cause the recipient discomfort or humiliation.
- Violating any law regarding stealing or vandalism, or the illegal possession of property belonging to the Frederic School District or other school district.
- Engaging in any form of hazing another student. Hazing is defined as the act of harassment by forcing (physically, morally, and/or mentally) someone to exact unnecessary or disagreeable work, to banter, ridicule or criticize someone, or to initiate someone into an organization.
- Flagrant violation of game rules and/or ejection from a contest. A student ejected from a contest is suspended for the rest of that competition and the next scheduled competition at the same level of competition as the disqualification. If it happens the next competition is a multi-school meet, which counts as one meet on the schedule, the student misses the entire competition.
- In/Out of School Suspension / Expulsion

Procedures and Consequences

The consequence of each case will be based on each incident's individual set of circumstances unless otherwise noted or required by the WIAA or Frederic School District. The Athletic Director/Principal will determine minimum penalties for any other unacceptable conduct contrary to the ideals, principles, and standards of the Frederic School District and the WIAA.

Minimum Consequence – Conference with participant and parent/guardian contact.

Maximum Consequence – Suspension from athletics/activities competition for the remainder of their high school career.

Guidelines for Code Violations

- IN SEASON VIOLATION—suspension application to take place at next practice and/or competition.
- OUT OF SEASON VIOLATION—suspension begins on the first day of practice.
- A student who is suspended for a code violation may have to forfeit all school awards for the activity season in which he/she was participating at the time of the infraction. It will be the decision of the Athletic Director and coaches to include or exclude a student who is suspended for a code violation from receiving school awards for the activity season in which he/she was participating at the time of the infraction.
- Offenses shall accumulate throughout the student's middle or high school career. Violations will not carry over from middle school to high school. Eighth graders will be considered high school students upon completion from the last day of middle school.
- A student who has a code violation and completes one (1) calendar year with no violations may reduce their total number of violations by one (1) by following the procedure outlined on page 9. (Clean Slate Policy) F. With each violation, the student's parent(s)/guardian(s) shall be notified by the Athletic Director in writing and an attempt will be made to contact via phone.
- There is a due-process procedure that is outlined in this document.
- All participants must finish the season in good standing in the activity when a suspension for a code violation has been served. This includes participating in all practices and attending all contests. If a student quits the team before completing the entire season or does not finish the season in good standing, the violation will remain on the records. The participant must finish serving the suspension before any further athletic competition can occur.
- Athletes and activities participants are under code 365 days a year. Any violations of the code that the AD is made aware of while school is not in session (Breaks, Summer Vacation, Etc.) will result in the consequences in the subsequent season of participation.
- **The School Board reserves the right to suspend any and all activity of a student who has been charged with a felony.**

Integrity Clause

In the event a student is being questioned for a possible violation of the provisions of the Code, it is expected that:

- The student shall be truthful
- The student be forthcoming with information
- The student will not be deceptive
- The student will be cooperative

If it is determined that the student was untruthful or deceptive prior to, or after determination of a violation of the Code, the Principal and/or Athletic Director has the authority to increase the consequences to the next level of violation or take other appropriate actions.

Enforcement Procedures

The Frederic School District recognizes the enforcement of its Activity Code should follow procedures designed to minimize the chance of error and maximize the opportunity for interested persons to be heard. To that end, the procedures set forth hereafter provide to the parent(s)/guardian(s), the students and the district, a vehicle to assure fairness and, to the extent possible, accuracy in resolving questions under this code.

- A person witnessing a violation or having reliable information regarding a violation must present the type, time and place of violation to the administrator or athletic director in person.
- The athletic director shall inform the coach, the student and the parent(s)/guardian(s) that a charge has been made. If

efforts to contact the parent(s)/guardian(s) on the telephone are unsuccessful, the student may be used to convey the oral or written message.

- If the student does not plead guilty and the administrator and coach find the student guilty of the charge based on the evidence, the student will be informed within two (2) working days of the decision, and a written notification will be mailed to the parent(s)/guardian(s).
- If the student or parent(s)/guardian(s) is not satisfied with the decision of the administrator and coach, they may appeal the decision.

Clean Slate Policy—If a student remains without a code violation for one calendar year, he/she may go back one step. For example, from one to none, from two to one, etc. This may be done only one time in the participant's high school career. The athletic department will be responsible for keeping all records of violation.

Appeal Procedures

- If the student or parent(s)/guardian(s) is dissatisfied with a decision or with a ruling or interpretation of the activity code, he/she may request an appearance before the Appeals Board. He/she must make the request in writing to the district administrator within one (1) student contact day from the notification of decision rendered by the director and coach. If the student does not request appearance before the one (1) student contact day limit, the appropriate penalty for that violation will be enforced.
- Students will **not** be eligible to participate while appealing to the Activity Board.
- The makeup of the Activity Board will be three (3) uninvolved teachers and two (2) uninvolved coaches. D. The school administrator shall serve as chairman of the board. The administrator shall be a non-voting member of the Board, except for his/her veto power. The duties of the chairman are:
 - To ensure that all proper procedures have been followed to warrant Board action.
 - To furnish all Board members with the documents that led to the administrator's action.
 - To advise the Board and the accused of the specific issue to be resolved.
 - To ensure that discussions and questions are properly and completely aired before a vote is taken.
 - To conduct a secret ballot at the conclusion of the discussion and question period.
 - To announce the result of the balloting to the accused and the Board. A majority vote shall be required for guilt.
 - To notify, in writing, the accused and his/her parent(s)/guardian(s) of the results of the Board's action and the penalty in accordance with existing extracurricular policies. h. To exercise veto power when he/she is not assured that all proper procedures have been satisfactorily executed or if insufficient evidence has been presented to the Board. If veto is exercised and additional information is needed, the Board may be reconvened within two (2) school days.
 - The proceedings of the hearing will be recorded in a written record and kept on file in the athletic office.
